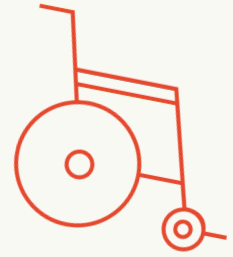


VOTING WHILE RECEIVING LONG TERM SUPPORTIVE SERVICES



As a person who receives care, there are important considerations to take into account before making a voting plan. Here are some things to consider:

I WANT TO OR HAVE TO VOTE IN PERSON ON ELECTION DAY:

Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act requires that state and local governments ensure that people with disabilities have a full and equal opportunity to vote. However, sometimes polling locations are not accessible. **You can always call your local Board of Elections to ask where your voting location is and have them make accommodations to help you exercise your right to vote.**
