


## Unpaid Caregivers in Illinois

- 1 in 6 adults in Illinois are caregivers, providing essential care to family members or friends with disabilities or health challenges but are not compensated for their care work.
- 19% of caregivers provide care for 40 hours or more per week. Among these caregivers, 51% are not in paid employment, highlighting the economic barriers faced by those providing unpaid care to family members and loved ones.
- **55% of caregivers are women**. 51% of caregivers have been providing care for more than 2 years.
- **11%** of those who *aren't* caregivers **expect to become caregivers** in the next 2 years.

2 in 5 (40%) of caregivers are caring for their parent or parent-in-law, nearly 1 in 5 (19%) are caring for their spouse or live-in partner, and 16% are caring for other relative(s).



Illinois' older adult population (60 years and older) is expected to **grow rapidly** in the coming decades, outpacing the growth of all other age groups. This could potentially impact caregiver demographics in the future. Currently, **47% of Illinois' caregivers are 55 years or older**.



\*The percentages do not sum to 100% due to 2.2% of respondents indicating "don't know," refusing to answer, or having missing data.

- **34% of caregivers have a disability** themselves, adding to the challenges they may face in providing care while managing their own health needs.
- In Illinois, an estimated <u>271,000 direct care job openings</u> will need to be filled by 2032, yet they remain **vastly underpaid**. Nearly <u>15,000 people remain</u> on **waiting lists** for home and community-based services. About <u>76% of working people in Illinois do not have paid family leave</u> through their jobs. These factors highlight the need for support for Illinois' caregivers.
