

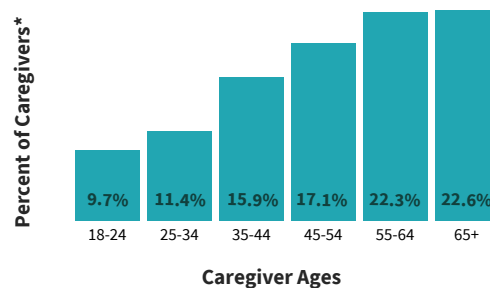
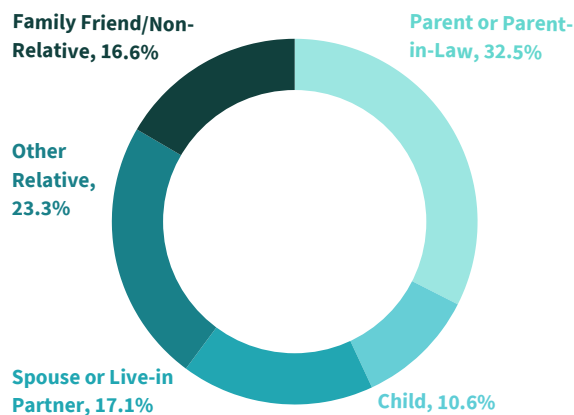
WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT Unpaid Caregivers in Michigan



- **1 in 5 adults** in Michigan are caregivers, providing essential care to family members or friends with disabilities or health challenges but are **not compensated** for their care work.
- **23% of caregivers** provide care for **40 hours or more per week**. Among these caregivers, **57% are not in paid employment**, highlighting the economic barriers faced by those providing unpaid care to family members and loved ones.
- **57% of caregivers are women**. 51% of caregivers have been providing care for more than 2 years.
- **13%** of those who aren't caregivers **expect to become caregivers** in the next 2 years.

Nearly **1 in 3 (33%)** of caregivers are caring for **their parent or parent-in-law**, **17%** are caring for **their spouse or live-in partner**, and nearly **1 in 4 (23%)** are **caring for other relative(s)**.

Michigan's older adult population (60 years and older) is expected to **grow rapidly** in the coming decades. This could potentially impact caregiver demographics in the future. Currently, **45% of Michigan's caregivers are 55 years or older**.



*The percentages do not sum to 100% due to 0.9% of respondents indicating "don't know," refusing to answer, or having missing data.

- **33% of caregivers have a disability** themselves, adding to the challenges they may face in providing care while managing their own health needs.
- In Michigan, an estimated **212,400 direct care job openings** will need to be filled by 2032, yet they remain vastly underpaid. Currently, **6,287 older adults and adults with physical disabilities** are on waiting lists for home and community-based services. About **76% of people** lack paid family leave through their jobs in Michigan. These factors highlight the need for support for Michigan's caregivers.
